New Countries are Applying the Harmonized System Nomenclature – Update 2012

More and more countries and economic regions are applying the Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System (Harmonized System Convention). This paper examines in the update 2012 the new countries which are using the worldwide uniform language of trade.

1 HS-APPLICATION FROM 2011

The Nomenclature which is governed by the Convention on the Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System (Harmonized System Convention, Brussels 14 June 1983) is effective in four new countries since January 2011¹ (or stated otherwise):

- Armenia,
- Bahamas (3/10/2011),
- Georgia,
- Liberia.

All four new contracting parties of the HS have agreed to apply the HS-headings (4-digit-code) and HS-subheadings (6-digit-code) within their customs tariff schemes.

2 HS-APPLICATION FROM 2012

One new contracting party of the HS is applying the HS-Nomenclature since January 2012²:

- Uruguay.

3 HS-APPLICATION FROM 2013

One new contracting party of the HS has agreed to apply the HS-Nomenclature from January 2013³:

- Angola.

4 HS-APPLICATION FROM 2014

One new contracting party of the HS has agreed to apply the HS-Nomenclature from January 2014⁴:

- Albania.

5 HS-APPLICATION FROM 2010

Two new contracting parties of the HS are applying the HS-Nomenclature since January 2010⁵:

- Cape Verde,
- Ecuador.

6 HS-APPLICATION UNCLEAR

One new contracting party of the HS is going to applying the HS-Nomenclature to an unknown point in the near future⁶:

- Costa Rica.

7 HS-APPLICATION ALL IN ALL

The HS-Nomenclature is has 143 contracting parties⁷, it is currently being applied by 140 contracting parties and more than 200 countries, territories, customs and economic unions worldwide which apply the Nomenclature for their customs tariff schedules⁸. That means that over 98 % of the merchandize in international trade is classified in terms of the HS⁹. The new contracting parties of the years 2007 to 2011 have been presented earlier.¹⁰ **Further HS-contracting parties?**

One other state has signed the HS-convention but its accession is not yet confirmed and the date of application of the HS-Nomenclature is not yet verified from the WCO: Burundi.¹¹
