

Figure 2 Gaps in call-back rates by warmth indicator for Latinos in Spain (excluding Catalonia) and in the US





Figure 3 Gaps in call-back rates for Latinos in Spain (excluding Catalonia) across gender and occupations



N Spain = 1,134


Control variables: phenotype
