Appendix B: Examples from Translating the Framing in Networking

Pillar of society*	Excerpts from pillar-specific framings (source: internal documents)
Churches**	“Biblical image of “one body and many parts” (1 Cor. 12). [...] Here it says, “If one part suffers, all the other parts suffer with it.”” “People in countries of the global south are already suffering from the consequences of the climate crisis (at 1.2 degrees of global warming). Our task is to work together with them to ensure that the consequences do not get worse and worse. Global solidarity is absolutely necessary in the climate crisis.”
Climate justice movements**	“We are still waiting for a climate protection law that can reliably and sustainably protect the livelihoods of this and future generations. [...] In the broader movement, people have always stood together in solidarity. But now is the moment to go beyond that and create shared momentum and cooperation, where each initiative takes its role in the climate justice movement, so we build the pressure we need on the federal government. Let's get big, connected and unignorable!”
Social associations**	“Climate crisis is a social problem. Individuals organized in social associations will be hit especially hard! The destabilization of the social system has catastrophic consequences (e.g., heat death). Simultaneously, social and welfare associations remain as central players in sustaining essential services.”
Healthcare organizations**	“1-3 billion people will lose their homes. How can the health care system and disaster management cope with this massive wave of migration when they are already overburdened due to increasing frequency of the climate change-induced severe weather events and disasters?”
Law enforcement (police)	“The government is breaking existing law. It is not complying with article 20a of the German Basic Law, and the BVerfG (Federal Constitutional Court) has declared the Climate Protection Act to be incompatible with our Basic Law.” “For police officers in particular, the escalating momentum of the climate catastrophe will have significant implications. By profession, they are the first to have to endure societal tensions, they will have to mediate between people fighting over water and other resources, and even if we succeed in limiting global warming to less than two degrees Celsius, experts from the IPCC project approximately 250 million climate refugees by 2100, a challenge that law enforcement will have to confront at both external and Schengen borders.”
Art and cultural institutions	“Art & culture often endeavour to provide platforms for discourse, aspiring to serve as a reflective mirror to society and create safe spaces where the contours of the future can be negotiated in terms its desired form and how it can be shaped.”
<i>Other pillars LG addresses: scientific institutions, politics (politicians and parties), agriculture organizations, press, prominent individuals, educational institutions</i>	

*The interviewees highlighted that LG actively leverages synergies between the pillars, e.g., by directly addressing areas of overlap.
